# From the Pastor

Hello friends,

Before I get to the Big News from last week, a bit of business. If you're reading this after Mass, thinking, "that wasn't Fr. Joe," it's likely because that wasn't me celebrating Mass. I must apologize – I usually like to publish my absences with a bit more notice, but Easter threw regularity off a bit. This weekend I am out in Indianapolis for a spiritual directee's wedding (pray for Audrey and her now-husband Sean). I'm following this up immediately with a retreat out in Oconomowoc. I'll be back Thursday night in time for our Confirmations out in Richland Center and Friday morning Mass as usual. In the meantime, there will not be Mass on Tuesday or Thursday, but Dcn. Tony will lead a Communion service on Wednesday at 5:15, followed by adoration.

Now for the Big News. I'm sure you've heard by now that Pope Francis passed away last Monday after a lengthy stay at the hospital for double pneumonia and finally a stroke and cardiac arrest. His death reminds me of our last pope who died in office, John Paul II. John Paul II fostered a deep devotion to Divine Mercy and appropriately died on Divine Mercy weekend (that is, this weekend) twenty years ago. Similarly, Pope Francis died on Easter Monday – a fitting moment to pass through death with hope into Christ's resurrection. For a man deeply committed to letting Jesus Christ's work, teaching, and Paschal mystery mean something, this was a powerful moment for him to pass into the next life himself. On Saturday morning the Church celebrated his funeral Mass in Rome, and we join the Church across the world in mourning his death and thanking God for his life and selfless service.

This also brings us into an interesting season in the church - a period known as "Sede Vacante," (the seat is empty), the preparation for the conclave that will choose the next pope. When a pope dies, the Church first enters a period of official mourning. All major decisions are put on hold save the selection of a new Holy Father. Meanwhile, within fifteen days after the pope's death all the Church's cardinals gather in Rome, hand in their phones, and enter a closed-door session to select the next pope. They proceed through a series of voting waves until a twothirds majority is reached. With each failed wave, black smoke billows out of a special chimney at the Vatican, until finally white smoke billows to indicate a successful vote. Technically any baptized male is a candidate for the papacy, but the chances of someone like me or Fr. Sam getting nominated are thankfully slim. Most likely is that one of the cardinals at the conclave will be the one to step out on the balcony and be hailed as the new Holy Father with a "habemus Papam," or "we have a pope!" I invite you to pray earnestly for the selection of our next Holy Father, perhaps even to join me in a daily rosary for that intention until the process is complete.

God bless you, and a very happy Easter to you, Fr. Joe


As we mourn the death of Pope Francis, let us join with Catholics worldwide in praying for the repose of his soul and for those in choosing his successor.


#### Carlo Acutis: Roadmap to Reality



The Church celebrates the Feast of Divine Mercy, the Sunday after Easter, on the 27<sup>th</sup> of April. This is a fitting time to focus on God's forgiving love, the mercy poured out through the suffering, death and resurrection of His Son, including the mercy He shows each one of us in ways too numerous to count.

Mercy means God's Heart desiring to alleviate our misery caused by personal sin. The "Good News" is that Jesus is the Divine Physician who came to heal the sickness of sin. As we receive His forgiveness, we are compelled by this love to trust Jesus and avoid sin in the future. The word trust is significant as it is a key aspect of the Divine Mercy message from Jesus. Trust is not blind, wishful thinking but hope based upon the Person who gave His life for us. Jesus is the Good Shepherd who leaves the ninety-nine to go after the one lost sheep. He is grieved heartsick - until He finds this sheep, and then lifts it upon His shoulders and carries it home. This describes Jesus' personal love for each of us.

Trust starts small and grows through experience. We practice and live trust on a daily basis "by praising and thanking God in all things." (Consoling the Heart of Jesus, Fr. Michael Gaitley, p. 95)

# Mercy

# The Word that Describes God's Heart

This is the place to begin in our desire to trust Jesus.

The merciful love of God is the central theme of the Bible and it is prevalent in the readings for Mass. The Psalm prayed for Divine Mercy Sunday puts words around the Lord's merciful love and what it means to trust Him. "I was hard pressed and was falling, but the LORD helped me. My strength and my courage is the LORD, and He has been my Savior" (Psalm 118:13-15). We can ask Jesus to help us trust Him, especially when we are "hard pressed" and "falling".

The Gospel describes the Risen Christ instituting the Sacrament of Reconciliation, a "Sacrament of Mercy," as He breathes on the Apostles and says to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained" (John 20; 22-23).

Jesus gave to Sr. Faustina, a Polish nun, messages about God's mercy and how much we need it. "Mankind will not have peace until it turns with trust to My mercy." "My mercy is greater than your sins, and those of the entire world. I let My Sacred Heart be pierced with a lance, thus opening wide the source of mercy for you. Come then with trust to draw graces from this fountain." (Diary, 300,1485)

The greatest attribute of God is His mercy. This is most evidently seen as we gaze upon the Crucifix, where Jesus takes upon Himself our sins that we might be freed from them and know His peace and joy.

This fountain of mercy is most especially in received the Sacrament of Reconciliation where we experience forgiveness and healing in a tangible way. Jesus said, "When you go to confession, know this, that I Myself am waiting there for you. I am only hidden by the priest, but I Myself act in your soul. Here the misery of the soul meets the God of mercy.... and I fill it with My light." (1602, 1725)

Set aside time for you and your family to receive the immense healing grace of making a good confession and receiving forgiveness. The Lord will bless you with *His* peace.

The simple **Chaplet of Divine Mercy** can be prayed anytime, but it is especially encouraged at the Hour of Mercy, which is 3:00PM - the hour of Jesus' death - or when someone is near death. The **Novena to Divine Mercy begins on Good Friday**. Find directions and the brief prayers for the Novena at the parish or visit thedivinemercy.org.
