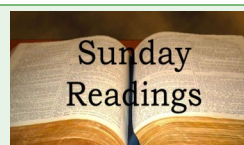

From the Pastor

Hello friends,

First, Ash Wednesday Business: after meeting with both Pastoral Councils last week and processing our survey responses a bit, we have a schedule. At 7:00 AM we'll have a Communion service led by Dcn. Tony in Viroqua, at 12:10 we'll have Mass number one in Viroqua, and at 5:15 PM Mass number two in Coon Valley.

Second, this last week Bishop Battersby sent out the following note to the priests and deacons of the Diocese. Let me share his words with you first, then I'll give you some further invitation. From +BB to his clergy (and now through us to you):

"Dear Brothers,

The recent events in Minneapolis remind me that we are not helpless regarding the chaos that seems to be so prevalent at this time. Prayer is able to move mountains so let's move a mountain together. I would ask that every parish participate in a sacrifice of prayer in the next two weeks. The following might be a way for your communities to participate: A mass for Justice and peace; a holy hour for civil calm; a group rosary in every parish; individual rosaries in families; a day of fasting are just some of the ways parishes can participate. Please make an intercession for this same purpose over the next two weeks. Please avoid the political angle, we have one thing to offer our people and that is Jesus who is the answer to every question that is human. Please keep Archbishop Hebda, his priests, deacons, religious and laymen and women in your prayers. For the unbeliever prayer is the last refuge of the incompetent, for the believer it is confidence in a loving Father's providence. Peace, +BB"

I think we have a good opportunity as a parish to follow the Bishop's invitation to present ourselves and our brothers and sisters to the Lord, and I suggest three ways to start. First, I invite you to an intentional day of fasting this coming Friday. Fasting is a powerful way of remembering that I am not in control, that I am not made for comfort, and that tying our own suffering to Christ's suffering opens the door to His resurrection wider. This coming Friday, I invite you to fast in some way for the intention of peace in our country and particularly in the Twin Cities area – that fasting can be giving up condiments, cream in your coffee, a meal or two or three, etc – be reasonable, but be bold. Second, I invite you to extra prayer in some capacity over the next week in your home, perhaps even following the Bishop's request for a family rosary. Finally, I invite you to join together as a parish for a rosary after each of next weekend's Masses – we'll take a moment after Mass for anyone who needs to depart to depart, then we'll proceed with the rosary shortly after. I have a particular fondness for the Marian title "Our Lady, Undoer of Knots" – perhaps this title may be a help right now too.

For now, thank you for sharing this moment in eternity with me and with each other. May God bless you and keep you through this week,

Archbishop Coakley Calls for Holy Hour as a Moment of Renewal for Our Hearts and Our Nation

WASHINGTON – “Your faith matters. Your prayers matter. Your acts of love and works of justice matter,” said Archbishop Paul S. Coakley, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. “The current climate of fear and polarization, which thrives when human dignity is disregarded, does not meet the standard set by Christ in the Gospel,” he continued, and as a step toward healing, invited bishops and priests across the United States to offer a Holy Hour for Peace.

Archbishop Coakley’s reflection and invitation follow:

Many people today feel powerless in the face of violence, injustice, and social unrest. To those who feel this way, I wish to say clearly: your faithfulness matters. Your prayers matter. Your acts of love and works of justice matter.

... Christ reminds us that even ‘a single cup of cold water’ given in his name will not go unrewarded (cf. Mt 10:42).

... We mourn this loss of life and deplore the indifference and injustice it represents. The current climate of fear and polarization, which thrives when human dignity is disregarded, does not meet the standard set by Christ in the Gospel.

... I invite my brother bishops and priests across the United States to offer a Holy Hour for Peace in the days ahead. Let us pray for reconciliation where there is division, for justice where there are violations of fundamental rights, and for consolation for all who feel overwhelmed by fear or loss. **I encourage Catholics everywhere to participate, whether in parishes, chapels, or before the Lord present in the quiet of their hearts for healing in our nation and communities.**

May this Holy Hour be a moment of renewal for our hearts and for our nation. ... let us ask the Lord to make us instruments of his peace and witnesses to the inherent dignity of every person...

4 CHAPLAINS SUNDAY

A flower has been presented by The Coon Valley American Legion as a remembrance for the selfless act of 4 Army Chaplains who gave their lives for others during the sinking of the USS Dorchester in WWII.

The USS Dorchester was a civilian liner that had been converted for military service and was part of a convoy of 3 troop ships that left New York on January 23, 1943 enroute to Greenland. with 902 officers and enlisted men, merchant seamen, and civilian workers aboard. They were escorted by the Coast Guard cutters Tampa, Escanaba, and Comanche.

Among the passengers were 4 Army Chaplains: the Rev. George Fox, a Methodist minister; Alexander Goode, a Jewish rabbi; John Washington, a Catholic priest; and Clark Poling, a minister with the Dutch Reformed Church.

In the early morning of February 3rd, the German submarine U-223 who had been trailing the troopship, fired a torpedo at 0055 hours that hit the Dorchester broadside. During the chaos following the attack, the lifeboats were filled and men were jumping overboard into the 32-degree water. The Army chaplains were helping troops, trying to calm the panicked men into the lifeboats and handing out life jackets. It soon became apparent there were not enough life jackets for everyone. One by one, the chaplains gave their life jackets to others so they could hopefully survive, knowing quite well that not having a life jacket themselves meant certain death in the cold water.

As the last of the survivors left the ship, they witnessed the Dorchester sinking with the 4 Army Chaplains standing with linked arms on the deck. They were praying and singing hymns as the ship sunk beneath the surface, embodying their shared faith. And to their dedication of service to others.

Of the 902 aboard the Dorchester, only 230 survived. Many of the survivors stated they owed their lives to the efforts of the 4 Chaplains.

Each year The American Legion conducts remembrance observances on the 1st Sunday in February proclaiming it as 4 Chaplains Sunday to honor the selfless commitment of the 4 Chaplains. The Coon Valley American Legion Post 116 presents flowers to the 6 local area churches in the memory of the 4 Chaplains.

Remembering the Four Chaplains

Each year, American Legion posts nationwide commemorate the selfless acts of the Four Chaplains on or near February 1, designated Four Chaplains Day by Congress in 1948. Below are the individual biographies of the Chaplains from Legion.org.

Our local Coon Valley Legion Post 116 honors and remembers the Four Chaplains this weekend, whose supreme sacrifice reflects Christ's teaching that "no one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends." In remembrance of their heroic faith, the Legion has donated the beautiful floral arrangement at the front of the church and provided the historical account of the Chaplains' self-giving love found on the reverse side of this insert.

Legion Post 116 will also host a Pancake Breakfast this Sunday, February 1, at the Legion Hall, serving from 8:00 a.m. to noon.

Lt. George L. Fox

As a medical corps assistant during World War I, Fox was highly decorated for bravery and awarded the Silver Star, Purple Heart and the French Croix de Guerre.

Fox studied at Moody Institute, Illinois Wesleyan and Boston University School of Theology. He and his wife, Isadore, had two children. While serving as a pastor in Gilman, Vt., he joined Walter G. Moore American Legion Post 41. He also served as the Legion's state chaplain and historian.

Fox went on active duty Aug. 8, 1942, the same day his son Wyatt enlisted in the Marine Corps. He was assigned to the Chaplains School at Harvard and reported to the 411th Coast Artillery Battalion at Camp Davis in Holly Ridge, N.C.



Lt. Alexander D. Goode

Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., in 1911, Goode became a rabbi like his father. He applied to become a Navy chaplain in early 1941, but was not accepted. After Pearl Harbor, he tried again, this time with the Army, and received an appointment on July 21, 1942. He went on active duty on Aug. 9, 1942, and was selected for the Chaplains School at Harvard. He was assigned to the 333rd Airbase Squadron in Goldsboro, N.C. In October 1942, he was transferred to Camp Myles Standish in Taunton, Mass. He and his wife, Theresa, had one daughter.



Lt. Clark V. Poling

Clark attended high school in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., where he was student body president and a football halfback. He was ordained in the Reformed Church in America and served as pastor of First Reformed Church in Schenectady, N.Y. He and his wife, Betty, had a son, Clark Jr. When America entered World War II, he decided to become a chaplain. Talking with his father, who served as a chaplain in World War I, he learned that chaplains in that war had the highest mortality rate of all military personnel. On June 10, 1942, Poling was appointed a chaplain with the 131st Quartermaster Truck Regiment and reported to Camp Shelby in Mississippi. Two months after *Dorchester's* sinking, Betty gave birth to their daughter.



Lt. John P. Washington

Born into a poor immigrant family, Washington took a newspaper route to help support his family. He loved music and sang in the church choir. In seventh grade, he sensed a call to the priesthood.

Washington attended Immaculate Conception Seminary in Darlington, N.J., where he was ordained a priest in 1935. Shortly after the Pearl Harbor attack, he received his appointment as an Army chaplain. In June 1942, he was assigned to the 76th Infantry Division at Fort Meade, Md. In November 1942, he reported to Camp Myles Standish in Taunton, Mass., where he was reunited with Fox, Goode and Poling – his classmates at Chaplains School at Harvard.
