



From the Parochial Administrator

Hello friends,

As you know I've been out of the office all week, so for my part I don't have terribly much business to report. However, for your own reading enjoyment I do have a few reflections from my experience at the FOCUS conference to share with you. Last week I mentioned that my intention heading down to St. Louis was to combine a personal retreat with a post-Christmas vacation in personally familiar territory – in a sense to return to my roots for a moment. That has certainly been the case. I am in no way physically rested from this experience – over the last five nights I've gotten less sleep than ever before in 2023 – but the chance to return to those spiritual roots and to be with these young men and women in such vulnerable and healing moments has been nothing short of blessed and rejuvenating.

I'm writing this week's article on Thursday afternoon from a hotel lobby in St. Louis. After a chilly night camping South of Peoria in my winter hammock setup (that's a whole different and strictly-irrelevant conversation I'm also very willing to have) I finished the drive down Monday morning to check in for the conference. There's something like 17,000 attendees here this year – around 10,000 students from FOCUS' American schools and 8 international extension campuses, 2,000 parishioners from parishes around the country, and by a friend's headcount at this morning's Mass some 515 priests and 18 bishops. The 1000 current missionaries and their families fill out the rest of that number. From my time as a missionary and seminarian I've been to enough of these conferences to lose precise count of how many I've been to, but one very new thing has been attending as a priest. You all have heard me talk enough about confession to know it's at the top of my gratitude list. Seeing all these students making room for a deeper encounter with the Lord over conference week has always been beautiful, but more than ever the roughly seventeen hours I've spent hearing confessions over the last five days have been filled with directly witnessing college students opening their hearts to the Lord's love and mercy in powerful ways. Honestly, it is one of the greatest privileges of being a priest to be with people in that moment of contrition and healing. A conference like this just elevates that experience.

Shortly after "you've already been a priest for two-and-ahalf years??" my old acquaintances have asked one question with some regularity: "you're in a parish? Did you bring any parishioners along?" to which I typically respond with something like "no, I was thinking of bringing some folks down when I was at my last assignment, but we didn't have quite enough time to get a group together this time." Not to suggest things could have been any different (we really would have needed more time to organize a parish group), it's still a bit sad in my heart not to share this experience with you. Thank you for bearing with me while I stepped away for this time, and perhaps coming along for a future conference might be something worth praying about. We'll talk.

May God bless you and keep you, Fr. Joe

THE EPIPHANY AND BAPTISM OF JESUS

This week we celebrate both the Epiphany of our Lord and His baptism in the Jordan river. Today (Sunday) is the Epiphany, which is the day that we remember the wise men from far away in the East coming to worship the newborn baby Jesus. God let them know that His Son was coming and gave them a special star in the sky to follow to find Him. When they found Jesus with His mother Mary they knelt down and gave Him their precious treasures of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Tomorrow (Monday) we celebrate the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan river. Jesus went to Saint John the Baptist, who was baptizing people and helping them repent from their sins. John knew that Jesus hadn't sinned but Jesus asked him to baptize Him anyway. This was the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. Until this time He had been living a life hidden from the rest of the world.

Like the wise men, we can give Jesus our best treasure: ourselves! If we decide to live our lives for Jesus then we will show the love of Jesus by our love for others.

The Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord

Epiphany means "manifestation." The first Epiphany was the visit of the Magi to adore the Christ Child. The Magi, who were actually scholars and scientists, came to be associated with kings. Their gifts reveal this holy Child's identity, gold for Christ's Kingship, incense for His divinity, and myrrh for His sacrifice on the Cross.

The Feast of Epiphany is traditionally celebrated as the *twelfth night* of Christmas, on January 6th. In the United States, this feast has been moved to the Sunday, January 8, 2023. In many families, the king figurines are moved a bit closer to the nativity scene every day from Christmas Day until Epiphany. Moreover, it is traditional for parish priests to bless water, chalk, and incense on the eve of Epiphany, and use them for the blessing of homes the next day.

The blessing of homes (schools, places of employment, etc.) on Epiphany revives the beautiful custom of making our homes sacramentals. Sacramentals make us more mindful, receptive and cooperative with God's grace. This blessing also reminds us that Christ is the One Who enlightens our hearts and homes with His love. He is the source of our hope, our comfort and our joy.

Marking doorways with blessed chalk is also a witness of faith. Use the chalk to mark above the main door and, if possible, over all exterior doors in the following fashion:

- Numerals to consecrate the New Year.
- Initials to remind us of the legendary names of the Magi— Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar—and also to represent the Latin motto: <u>Christus mansionem benedicat</u> (May Christ bless this house)
- Four crosses to represent the four seasons.
- Example for the year 2023: 20 + C + M + B + 23

Epiphany Blessing of the Home

If a priest is present, he leads; otherwise, the head of the family is the leader.

All present go from room to room, blessing each room with holy water and praying the following prayer:

Blessed be all the rooms of this home. May each of them be holy and filled with the spirit of happiness and peace, love and affection. May the spirit of pardon and affection reside with us and be always ready to heal our divisions. May the spirits of joy and laughter, hope and faith, playfulness and prayer, compassion and love be perpetual guests in our home. May God's holy blessing rest upon us all, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

As the leader inscribes the initials of the three Magi above the exterior doorways using the blessed chalk, the following prayer is prayed:

Inscription for the year 2023: 20 + C + M + B + 23

Blessed be this doorway. May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us as we welcome them with respect and kindness. May all our comings and goings be under the seal of God's loving care. May we seek and serve, in everyone we meet, Jesus, Who is Lord forever and ever. Amen.
