

Hello friends, and happy Easter!

Toward the end of a past Lent, a fellow in one of my small groups made a telling comment — "I'm just so ready for Lent to be over." Maybe you've experienced the Holy Spirit's loaded, suspenseful movement in a moment like this — I certainly did here. This guy had been doing the serious work of Lent in a serious way, and five weeks in he was feeling the fatigue of a full season's deep interior work. At the start of the season, we had been talking about what we tend to talk about at the start of Lent or Advent — how important it is to take on some significant, impactful kind of prayer, fasting, and abstinence. Advent is great and accessible for this type of thing (after all, anyone can white-knuckle their way through three and a half weeks of extra effort) but Lent is just long enough to meet your breaking point, fall on your face, fruitfully realize you're not as strong as you thought, and pick yourself up for the last leg of the race. So here this guy was, five weeks into a particularly challenging Lent, having come to that decision point: now that I'm out of steam, am I willing to let my emptiness and helplessness be the place where the Holy Spirit gives me his strength? That guy was at a fork in the road — he could go one way or the other, but he definitely could not pretend his life of discipleship after that fork would look quite the same as it had before.

Over the last few days, we've been praying through the shortest and weightiest liturgical season of the year – 52 hours of remembering and walking through Christ's Passion from his Last Supper, agony, and arrest (Holy Thursday) to his trial, crucifixion, and death (Good Friday), culminating finally with his resurrection at the Easter Vigil. Holy Thursday and Good Friday see Jesus at the breaking point, where his decision to persevere and keep carrying his cross for us finally kills him. Easter sees the resurrection breaking through the impenetrable tragedy of this moment. The whole ordeal of Lent is a leadup to this 52-hour-long moment – it's six weeks of bringing ourselves to the point of honesty and humility about where we need Christ's resurrection to impact our lives. If we did it well, we hopefully arrived at Easter with very little left to give, so ready for Lent to be over, so ready to experience the absolute power of Christ's resurrection over death.



Now we start a new liturgical season. The hard work of Lent took us 44ish days, and the tense watchfulness of the Triduum took three. Now we've got fifty days of Easter before Pentecost comes along to live in Christ's resurrection. Over the next several weeks we're going to hear stories about Jesus' disciples encountering him in the strange newness of his resurrection, coming to terms with the fact that things aren't the same as they were before, learning to understand what life looks like with Christ's light shining into the darkness. Hold onto the tension of this newness as we go ahead. You've let the Holy Spirit lead you through Christ's suffering and death, now let him lead you into the resurrection!

Divine Mercy Sunday - Apr 16



The Church celebrates the Feast of Divine Mercy the Sunday after Easter, April 16th. This is a fitting time to focus on God's forgiving love, the mercy poured out through the suffering, death and resurrection of His Son, including the mercy He shows each one of us in ways too numerous to count

Mercy means God's Heart desiring to alleviate our misery. Personal sin causes misery. The "Good News" is that Jesus is the Divine Physician who came to heal the sickness of sin. As we receive the forgiveness He offers in the Sacrament of Confession, we are compelled by this love to trust in Him and avoid sin in the future. The word "trust" is significant as it is a key aspect of the Divine Mercy message from Jesus. Trust is not blind, wishful thinking but hope based upon the Person who gave His life for us. Jesus describes Himself as the Good Shepherd who leaves the ninety-nine to go after the one lost sheep. He is grieved – heart-sick – until He finds this one sheep, and then lifts it upon His shoulders and carries it home. This describes Jesus' deep and personal love for *each* one of us.

Trust starts small and grows through experience. We practice and live trust on a daily basis "by praising and thanking God in all things." (Consoling the Heart of Jesus, Fr. Michael Gaitley, p. 95) This is the most practical place to start in our desire to trust Jesus in everyday circumstances. Watch for the effect it will have!
