

The law of the Lord delights the human heart FOCUS: and guides the steps of our lives.

Today's Gospel opens with the words and intentions of Luke the Evangelist. He has decided to write a Gospel – a narrative of the events regarding Jesus Christ that will draw from the memories of those who witnessed his life, death, and resurrection, and who have handed on his teachings to future generations. We cling to that Gospel message, which reminds us of God's mercy and challenges us to live in Christ.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

Nehemiah, Ezra, and others instruct the people to rejoice and not be sad, for their God has made the day holy. Saint Paul instructs the Corinthians, using the image of the body to describe the Church and explaining that each person has a role in it. In the Gospel, Jesus reads from the book of the prophet Isaiah in the synagogue in Nazareth and proclaims, Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing.

This Weeks Readings by Kieran O'Mahony, OSA

Mon. 24 January St Francis de Sales, bishop and doctor 2 Samuel 5:1-7, 10 This is a key reading for two reasons. David is "elected" as king and secondly he make Jerusalem his capital.

Mark 3:22-30 It can still shock that some of Jesus contemporaries proposed he was doing the work of the evil one. The thinking may have been like this: he is doing powerful deeds, but we do not believe he comes from God. Therefore...!

Tuesday 25 January The Conversion of St Paul

Acts 22:3-16 The conversion of St Paul had huge consequences for early Christianity. He was a man of terrific energy and physical courage, inspired by a deep desire to do God's will. His encounter with Jesus placed his great gifts of intellect and spirit at the service of the Christian movement, to its lasting enrichment up to today. He himself tells of his conversion in his own words in Galatians 1.

Mark 16:15-18 Our reading today is chosen for the very f irst words which capture something of the ministry of Paul, who went out to the whole known world of his time, that is, the Roman Empire, especially around the eastern Mediterranean.

Wednesday 26 January Sts Timothy and Titus

2 Timothy 1:1-8 The tone of encouragement is always needed and today, more than ever, we need the reminder to fan into a flame the gift of God.

Mark 4:1-20 This long reading can be tricky. The original parable is given first, a parable from the lips of Jesus. The later explanation of the parable comes from church tradition, a kind of allegorical reading. The allegory narrows the original meaning of the parable. In between, the question of the disciples is difficult. It seems to be answering a later issue: how was that that most of Jesus' fellow Jews did not recognize him as the Messiah?

Thursday 27 January St Angela Merici, virgin

2 Samuel 7:18-19, 24-29 The full context of this reading is interesting. David proposed building a temple, a house for God. Speaking through Nathan the prophet, God said, no, but that God would build him a house, a dynasty. The bit we get to hear today is the pious part!! Christians see in Jesus, the Son of David, the fulfilment of God's promise to be faithful to the house of David.

Mark 4:21-25 It may help to recall that in those days a lamp was a naked flame. Putting it under a bed would not be advisable at all! The enigmatic second saying is presented as a shocking contrast. It should read, "from the one who thinks he has (but really does not), even what he thinks he has will be taken away. It is a stern wake-up call.

Fri. 28 Jan. St Thomas Aquinas, religious and theologian 2 Samuel 11:1-4, 5-10, 13-17 This is a horrible and

fascinating story. The opening lines set up the tension. It begins with, at the turn of the year when kings to campaigning and we expect to hear, "David went to war", but on the contrary the wretch was at home committing adultery. To cover his tracks, David acted really, really badly, as we hear.

Mark 4:26-34 A further few seed parables illuminate the Gospel. The parable of the farmer asleep is especially encouraging: just let things grow. Cf. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. (1Corinthians 3:6))


Saturday 29 January

2 Samuel 12:1-7, 10-17 Because of David's adultery with the wife of Uriah and his subsequent murder, the prophet Nathan is sent by God to accuse David of his sins. The prophet begins by tricking the king into righteous anger and then very cleverly catching him out. The electric words are "You are the man." David wasn't the first or last person in the world to have been a hypocrite or to have acted inconsistently.

Mark 4:35-41 Already at the hands of Mark, the calming of the storm is to be read symbolically. The later church, under tremendous pressure during the Jewish War, questions the presence and even the concern of Jesus. The final question is one we need to ask again and again.
