

### This Weeks Readings by Kieran O'Mahony, OSA

### **Monday 6 December** ~ Isaiah 35:1-10 (St Nicholas)

Transformation is the message today, first in images (the desert in bloom), then in physical cures (the blind shall see, etc.) and finally in the human heart (everlasting joy on their faces).

Luke 5:17-26 - The effort of the friends is very impressive in this story...and their efforts meet with a double response, healing and forgiveness. On a spiritual level, we can be "paralysed" too and in need of a word of mercy.

### **Tuesday 7 December** ~ Isaiah 40:1-11 (St Ambrose)

Powerful images in this reading should awaken a deep longing in our hearts. Let us come again to the great shepherd of our souls, holding us and leading us in all circumstances.

Matthew 8:12-14 - The parable of the lost sheep makes a direct link with Isaiah. Of course, the ninety-nine who don't stray at all also don't really exist! We are, all of us, lost sheep and in need of guidance.

Wednesday 8 December ~ Genesis 3:9-15, 20 (Immaculate Conception) - The early stories in Genesis explore common human experiences, including sin, shame and the "outsourcing" of blame! All very human, of course. The serpent symbolises something more sinister-the power of sin, against which we need the grace of God.

Ephesians 1:3-6, 11-12 - The great hymn from Ephesians explores God's grace in Christ, thus inviting us to gratitude.

Luke 1:26-38 - Mary's yes is in contrast to the "no" of Adam and Eve...and all the rest of us of course! It is great to hear again that "nothing is impossible for God."

### **Thursday 9 December**

Isaiah 41:13-20 - The opening line of this poem gives the key to the rest: Do not be afraid. The reading goes on to explore such deep trust using several metaphors: harvesting, drought, and barrenness.

Matthew 11:11-15 - So, who really was John the Baptist? In Jesus' estimation, John was the greatest of the old dispensation. In orthodox tradition he is called the forerunner, the *prodromos*. Yet even he falls into the second rank compared with the least in the kingdom of heaven!

### Friday 10 December

Isaiah 48:17-19 - There is a great promise in this reading, but also one big "if": if only you had been alert to my commandments. Isaiah can tell us the rest!

Matthew 11:16-19 - There's no pleasing some people, seems to be the message of this passage.

[The very last line, puzzling to us, calls for special comment. The passage comes from the Q community, who produced the Sayings Source (Q), behind parts of Matthew and Luke. In the view of that community, John, Jesus and their members were all children of transcendent wisdom. Originally, the last verse read: But Wisdom was vindicated by her children. (Q 7:35; see Luke 7:35.) For Matthew, Jesus himself is our Wisdom and so he alters the text and continues his portrait to Jesus as wisdom in Mt 11:25-30.]

### This Weeks Readings

Christmas. Go to diolc.org/deeper and click "Praying with Ecclesiasticus 48:1-4, 9-12 - Elijah remained a figure of fascination long after his death, as we hear in this reflection. An "Mysteries of the Rosary" for a Prayer Card with the five Elijah-type figure was expected to usher in the long-expected Messiah. The blessedness of this is caught in the very appealing beatitude which closes the reading.


Matthew 17:10-13 - As noted above, the expected Elijah-type figure was based on Mal 3:1. By identify- ing John as Elijah, Jesus affirms the significance of the present moment and his own ministry.


### Family Activity—New Questions Each Week Sharing Advent and Christmas Joys and Memories

### Family Resource The Joy of Giving

### The-Joy-of-Giving

It's common to look forward to the gifts we'll receive at Christmas. But as we learn about the life of St. Nicholas – from which we derive our "Santa Claus" – we will quickly find that it is more blessed indeed to give than to receive.

As Christmas approaches, most of us spend time making lists of presents that we hope to receive. Advent is an appropriate time to learn about the life of St. Nicholas and to remember that it is more blessed to give than to receive.

Nicholas was born during the third century in a village that is located in modern-day Turkey. His wealthy parents raised him to be a devout Christian. Sadly, they died in an epidemic while he was still young. Nicholas obeyed Jesus' words to "sell what you own and give the money to the poor." He used his whole inheritance to help the needy, the sick, and the suffering. The church recognized his total dedication to God and declared him Bishop of Myra while he was still a young man. Nicholas was known across the region for his generosity to people in need, for his love of children, and for his concern for sailors. You can find many legends about his life on the Internet and in library books. This special day celebrates the stories of his generosity and goodness. The life of St. Nicholas has much to teach us.

# A saint of the Catholic Church, his Feast Day is December 6.

This Advent Season, challenge your family to approach Christmas by focusing on St. Nicholas as the model of giving. Rather than focusing on what you and the rest of your family may receive, think about what your family can give. In addition to money, you can offer the gifts of time, talent or treasure for others here at home – and for your mission family far away. Ask family members to think of meaningful, nonmaterial gifts they have received (*a compliment, a word of encouragement, a helping hand, etc.*) and to share the story of those gifts. Brainstorm ways in which each member of your family can give rather than receive – and to do so for the Missions. Ask each person to choose at least one way to give time, talent and treasure for each week of Advent. Here are a few suggestions:

• Commit to praying daily for children, especially for troubled young people.

• Collect non-perishable food from neighbors and family. Take those items to a local food pantry.

• Write a letter to your members of Congress or governor, telling what you think should be done to help poor families.

• Place your MCA donation container (box) on your dinner table. At every meal, after you give thanks for the food, place a donation in the box .

• Call someone you know who is experiencing sorrow to offer comfort.

Invite everyone to write down their good actions on small pieces of paper, notecards or self-stick notes and place them in a special place. Conclude your time together with the following *Prayer for A Giving Heart*. *Good and gracious God*,

You have always been so generous to us.

*Teach us what it means to give without expecting anything in return.* 

Make each one of us grateful for all we have.

Create in us, Lord, a heart that gladly gives.

*May the hope of Jesus be seen in our hearts, our words, and our actions,* 

throughout this Advent Season.

*Help us remember the greatest gift shown to us – the Christ Child.* 

*Inspire us to respond to the needs of those around us. We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*
