

From the Pastor

Hello friends,


Last Tuesday was a spiritual triple threat, all tied to the Solemnity (codeword for a big feast day) of St. Joseph, Husband of Mary. Let's unpack it.

First, I share his name, which really just applies to myself (and all you other Joes out there).

Second, St. Joseph is the Patron Saint of our Diocese (technically under the title "St. Joseph the Workman," which we also celebrate on May 1). As far as saints are concerned, St. Joseph is pretty high on the list of significant players – his selflessness (or rather self-gifting), docility, and confidence in God's providence led him to lead the Holy Family, to protect and provide for Mary and Jesus. When I first got here 1 3/5 years ago, my messaging leaned hard into the stewardship of pastorship – I've inherited them from his predecessors, who inherited them from ...you get the gist. In the same way, some day I will hand over pastorship to another priest to tend to your needs. I am honored to be your steward for this season, and I see in St. Joseph's stewardship the real model of pastoral care.

Third, at 6:00 AM on Tuesday an announcement went out that Pope Francis has accepted Bishop Callahan's resignation and named Bishop Gerard Battersby (presently an auxiliary bishop in Detroit) the eleventh bishop of the Diocese of La Crosse, to be installed on May 20. This is a significant moment, folks. Over the last 150-something years we have had ten bishops, which is to say that the guard doesn't change every day. Bishop Callahan has faithfully led us through a hard fourteen years with a prayerful heart, courageous suffering, and a Franciscan love for his people. Now as we prepare for a new shepherd, allow me to quote Bishop Battersby's beautiful charge from Tuesday's conference: "I don't come to you as the best bishop you could receive. If you want the best bishop you can receive, then you're gonna have to fast and pray for me, that the Holy Spirit might make me the one that you need. The one that he has in store and planned for you. And so, I ask you to pray for me, and to love me and receive me, and to allow me to bring Jesus to you in the way that the Holy Spirit has gifted me these many years of priesthood." I will be doing just that, and with a pastor's love I ask you to do the same.

God bless you this Holy Week! ~ Fr. Joe






Meditations for the Season of Lent

AND BELIEVE

The King of the Jews

Mark 14:1—15:47

The final week of Jesus' life was filled with activity, from his triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Sunday until his death on Friday. We remember his actions, his prayers, his trial, his sufferings, and finally his death. As Lent draws to a close, we have the opportunity to join our sorrows more deeply with him so that we, too, can rise again with him on Easter.



Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, or the way of the Cross? By allowing yourself to enter more

fully into the experience of the Passion, Easter Sunday will become even more meaningful.

POINTS TO PONDER

• What part of the Passion narrative touches you the most deeply?

• Can I set aside time this week to simply be in the presence of the Lord?

• As I prepare for Easter, am I spending as much time on spiritual preparations as I am on Easter baskets and a special meal?

And though every day a man lives may rightly be a day of repentance, yet is it in these days more becoming, more appropriate, to confess our sins, to fast, and to give alms to the poor; since in these days you may wash clean the sins of the whole year.



LENT PRAYER Unto to you, I cry, my God!

"My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" — Psalm 22:2

Out of the depths of my sorrow, I call to you. Do not let me be forgotten, Lord, but hear and answer me.



HOLY THURSDAY liturgy recalls the Last Supper and the First Eucharist, where Jesus models for us how to serve when he washes the discples' feet. It also commemorates the establishment of the priesthood.

GOOD FRIDAY is the only day of the year on which Mass is not celebrated. The Good Friday liturgy, in its solemnity, invites us to enter deeply into the passion of Our Lord. This is a day of fasting and abstinence.

HOLY SATURDAY is the final day of preparation for Easter. During the Easter Vigil, new members are brought into the Church, and we celebrate the great mystery of our redemption. The Pascal candle that is lit at the Vigil remains throughout the year.
