

From the Pastor

Hello friends.

We are just one week away from Holy Week now. We're pulling back on decorations around our churches, marking the subdued, somber feeling of this particular culmination, and we catch our breath one last time before the plunge. I've been leaning hard into the Story of Holy Week – it's not a scattered smattering of extra events, but one long passage from Jesus' entry into Jerusalem to His Last Supper with the disciples to His ordeal from the Garden until the crucifixion until finally we reach the triumph of the resurrection. If you'd like to be a bit more familiar with this whole narrative, I'll refer you back to last weekend's bulletin (available on either church's website), and in the meantime allow me to highlight a few of the Moments and extra curriculars available over the next two weeks.

The Holy Week Schedule:

Palm Sunday Masses at the regular times

Passion Play in Cashton at 7:00 PM on March 24, with a few of our Coon Valley kids included

Monday Confess-a-thon (not the official name), where a dozen or so priests (myself included) will rotate through at the Cathedral to hear confessions from 9:00-6:00

Tuesday Chrism Mass at the Cathedral at 10:30, where the priests of our diocese gather to renew their promises and the Bishop blesses the Chrism Oil, Oil for Anointing of the Sick, and Oil of Catechumens

Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper, 5:15 in Viroqua. Followed by an evening of adoration until midnight in the room next to Fran's office (follow the hall right around from the church). The Mass of the Lord's Supper ends with a suspenseful procession out of the church with the Blessed Sacrament to a separate chapel. We have a signup at both churches this weekend to make sure there are a few folks present each hour until midnight — if you are available, please take a look and sign up for one of these slots. Likewise, feel free to stop in even without signing up. This evening follows that charged question Jesus asks his disciples, "could you not watch one hour with me?"

Good Friday services at 12:10 in Coon Valley and 3:00 in Viroqua.

Passion Play in Viroqua at 7:00 PM

Easter Vigil at 8:15 PM in Viroqua. This is a long one, and profoundly beautiful.

Easter Sunday 8:00 AM Mass in Coon Valley, 10:30 in Viroqua.

After the 10:30 Mass we'll have a potluck Easter Brunch downstairs – please RSVP by marking yourself down on the signup sheet or by emailing juliemoore29@gmail.com.

Okay, deep breath. God bless you and have a holy, Holy Week!




Jesus Predicts His Own Death

John 12:20-33

As the Gospel opens, Jesus is well aware that his time on earth is coming to a close. In fact, he admits that he is "troubled," but adds, "Yet what should I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? But it was for this purpose that I came to this hour.

Father, glorify your name." Upset as he admits he is, he still puts the Father first.



In today's Gospel, a voice responds to Jesus' prayer by saying, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." Also, Jesus tries to explain to the crowds his true identity, the Son of Man, and the real meaning of the cross — the salvation of all the world.

Through his obedience to the Father, Jesus reveals God's glory. He foreshadows his crucifixion and death through the language of service: "Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will be my servant" (Jn 12:26). As we enter the final weeks of Lent, we are called to bring forth the glory of the Lord as we follow Christ in service to God and one another. Let us remember not just the pain of Christ's passion, but the reason for his death — to bring us the gift of reconciliation with God the Father.

POINTS TO
PONDER

• Have you ever considered that Jesus might have been "troubled" about what was going to happen to him? How can the way he dealt with his anxiety help you deal with your own worries and fears?

• Is there someone in my life that I need to forgive? Do I keep in mind that it is as we forgive that we are forgiven?

• How am I doing on keeping my Lenten discipline?

When Jesus stepped into the waters of the Jordan and was baptized by John the Baptist, he did so not because he was in need of repentance, or conversion; he did it to be among people who need forgiveness, among us sinners, and to take upon himself the burden of our sins.

CATHOLIC INSIGHTS

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

According to Church law, all Catholics "having reached the age of discretion" are required to confess all "grave sins" at least once a year. It is also recommended that they confess venial sins. Lent is the ideal time to make a good confession. Most parishes offer extended confession times and even special penance services.

Family Activity

Random Acts of Kindness

We are called to serve one another with joyful hearts! As a family, write out on slips

of paper several random acts of kindness that can be carried out over the week. Include things like smiling at someone, picking up trash, making a phone call to a grandparent, and helping someone carry a package. Throughout the week, have each family member draw a slip and complete the action. When everyone has completed their random act, talk about what happened and how it felt.



Fasting, one of the Lenten practices, is often observed as fasting from food. It is not because our bodies need to be punished (or that we need to go on a diet). We fast to allow our physical hunger to remind us of our spiritual hunger, our need for God. We fast to remind ourselves of our baptismal commitment and need for renewal.

"It is called the *sacrament of confession*, since the disclosure or confession of sins to a priest is an essential element of this sacrament. In a profound sense it is also a 'confession' — acknowledgment and praise — of the holiness of God and of his mercy toward sinful man.

"It is called the *sacrament of forgiveness*, since by the priest's sacramental absolution God grants the penitent 'pardon and peace.'

"It is called the *sacrament of Reconciliation*, because it imparts to the sinner the love of God who reconciles: 'Be reconciled to God' (2 Cor 5:20). He who lives by God's merciful love is ready to respond to the Lord's call: 'Go; first be reconciled to your brother' (Mt 5:24)."
